## Award 2021

Students have until 25 June to submit their creative videos to the Student Video Award

The deadline to enter the second edition of the Student Video Award is fast approaching, with students encouraged to finish editing their videos and submit them to Pro Carton prior to 25 June for their chance to win the €5,000 prize.



The <u>Student Video Award</u> challenges young talent to create a short movie, up to two and a half minutes in length, that highlights the benefits of cartonboard packaging.

The competition, which made its debut last year, proved to be a huge success and received entries from 13 different countries across Europe. The competition is expected to be even more fierce this year as students can take the lead from last year's winners which promoted cartonboard in innovative ways - like using the ASMR technique and by following a day in the life of a talking carton!

Tony Hitchin, General Manager of Pro Carton, said: "We are delighted that our judges this year include an advertising guru, Simon Bolton, and an international film producer, Bady Minck. The competition appeals to media and marketing students as much as it does to film and animation students so it's great to have an advertising expert who has worked for Ogilvy & Mather, JWT and WPP on our panel. The judges will have a hard job to select a winner, indeed, last year two entrants shared the prize fund. Cartons have so many features and benefits. The environmental benefits are fairly obvious – cartonboard is renewable, recyclable and biodegradable - but it will be interesting to see if entrants consider some of the marketing advantages that carton packaging offers."

#### What is cartonboard?

Cartonboard is a multilayer paper-based material with, usually, three or more layers of fibre derived from wood, or recycled materials such as paper or cartonboard. It is often used in packaging to make cartons for everyday products, such as breakfast cereals, frozen foods, luxury fragrances and pharmaceuticals.

#### Is cartonboard the same as cardboard?



Cardboard is a generic term and, whilst cartonboard is a type of cardboard, it is different from 'corrugated cardboard' which is a firmer, heavy-duty paper-based packaging commonly used for transport (like Amazon parcels). In contrast, Cartons are always printed often with high quality graphics and special varnishes and finishes. Liquid packaging board (e.g. Tetra Pak) used to hold milk and fruit juice is not categorised as cartonboard.
